Engagement with parliamentarians and stakeholders

We were delighted to welcome Professor Peter Johnson, NHS England National Clinical Director for Cancer, to the <u>second</u> <u>meeting of the All-Party Parliamentary</u> <u>Group for Diagnostics</u>, chaired by Maggie Throup MP. Attended by parliamentarians, charity and industry reps, the issues discussed included workforce capacity, tech and digital solutions and NHS leadership.

As joint secretariat for the APPG with the Royal College of Radiologists, we will be coordinating two roundtable meetings on 21 June and 5 July on Community Diagnostic Centres (CDCs).

The CDC programme roll out has been a significant development within the NHS and has implications for patient care across the country. We know early diagnosis and treatment leads to better outcomes for patients, which is why these centres are so vital. The APPG aims to convene key stakeholders and experts involved in the CDC programme to share successes and ideas for improvements.

Working for members

Infection sciences workforce report published

The College collaborated with the British Infection Association (BIA) to seek information about the delivery of microbiology, virology and infectious diseases expertise across the NHS in 2021.

The College has <u>published</u> The infection sciences workforce: challenges and solutions. The data shows a pending workforce crisis. Despite the move to create infection services to allow for greater use of the diverse skills among infection specialists, the survey results indicate that there remains an inability to meet the ever-increasing demands on this specialist workforce.

The Pathology Portal

There are now over 3,600 resources on the Pathology Portal, available to all pathologists, including cases, videos, podcasts, quizzes to assess learning and other relevant materials. With the user base of the Pathology Portal currently at 1,500 users and growing constantly – if you have not signed up yet, you can find out <u>more information here</u>.

There is now superb haematology content available and the Pathology Portal has been actively working on your requests for content in several key areas. Specifically, good progress is being made in molecular pathology, immunology, oral pathology, and reproductive science. By focusing on these areas, the Pathology Portal aims to broaden its coverage and provide comprehensive resources for

users seeking information in these specialised fields.

Several new editors have been welcomed to the team to support the next phase of Clinical Biochemistry content as well as Paediatric and Perinatal pathology. In addition, new microbiology and ophthalmic editors have been welcomed into the team, adding their expertise to the platform's growing team.

The Pathology Portal platform also continues to develop including updates to allow faster processing of whole slide images, allowing a range of high-quality slides, including z-stacked images to be viewed and studied.

International Collaboration on Cancer Reporting (ICCR) datasets consultation

The ICCR drafts for paediatric datasets (hepatoblastoma, neuroblastoma, paediatric renal tumours, paediatric rhabdomyosarcoma) and thoracic dataset (tumours of the lung – small diagnostic and cytopathological specimens) are now available for review. The documents will be available for comments until Friday 14 July 2023.

International

Ghana online lecture series

The first online video lectures in the second Ghana lecture series launched in May. Free to access, the lectures feature a broad range of educational content.

The launch features 14 new lectures, including the gastrointestinal system, principles of antibiotic chemotherapy and targeted therapy for non-Hodgkin lymphoma. The new content has been developed in collaboration with the Ghana College of Physicians and Surgeons, in conjunction with The Tropical Health Education Trust. International webinar

On Friday 26 and Saturday 27 May 2023, the College delivered a webinar for the Sub-Saharan Africa International Pathology School (IPS). The College's IPS offers medical students the chance to discover more about pathology and its role in healthcare, learn about the diverse range of pathology specialties and develop a greater understanding about the knowledge and skills required to become a pathologist.

The speakers for this webinar were from countries across Sub-Saharan Africa including Ghana, Kenya, Nigeria, Sierra Leone, South Africa, Zimbabwe. During this IPS, we had attendees join from similar countries in the Sub-Saharan Africa region. The attendees had the opportunity to ask questions directly to pathologists at different stages of their careers, hear from current pathology trainees about the tasks they conduct and learn more about pathology training programmes that are delivered in the region.

We are currently making plans to deliver an IPS for the South East Asia region at the end of August.

College conferences and symposia

<u>Cytopathology Study Day – Hybrid Event – Bookings now open</u> 6 July 2023 5 CPD credits

The programme will consist of a series of slide seminars covering specimen types such as urine, serous fluids, and samples from various sites including head & neck, respiratory tract and pancreatico-biliary tract.

The format will be that of a short presentation (15 minutes) followed by an interactive slide seminar (45 minutes) using whole slide scans for the specimens and sites listed above. The meeting would be suitable for trainee and practising pathologists and BMS. The aims include discussion of a diagnostic approach to various cytology specimens, the use of international terminology systems and good report writing.

Medical examiner training

The College is the <u>lead medical royal college for medical examiners</u> and provides training for any doctor wishing to work as a medical examiner. Participants will need to complete 26 mandatory elearning modules and attend an entire face-to-face training day to receive a certificate of completion. The day includes short presentations, small group discussions of case scenarios and the opportunity to share experience. Medical examiner training is open only to medically qualified individuals who work in England and Wales.

New medical examiners who successfully complete the training and the e-learning modules will be invited to join the College as members.

Medical examiner officer training

The College also leads on the training of medical examiner officers (MEOs).

MEOs work closely with medical examiners and undertake tasks such as coordinating the completion of death certificates and referrals to the coroner, and speaking to clinicians and bereaved families.

MEOs may come from a wide range of backgrounds. For example, nurses, healthcare scientists or bereavement officers although this list is not exhaustive. More information, including a <u>model job</u> <u>description, is on the College website.</u>

The face-to-face training day is the second part of MEO training. Everyone attending the course must have completed the 26 mandatory core e-learning modules before the date of the course to get the most out of the training day. The e-learning modules <u>can be accessed here</u>. (Registration with e-Learning for Healthcare is required.)

News from external organisations

<u>National Institute for Health and Care Research (NIHR) develops new e-learning programme</u>

The NIHR has invested almost £1 million to create a new programme of e-learning content for health and care professionals with an interest in research.

The online modules are free to use. They are ideal for health professionals interested in a research career, even if they have little or no research experience so far.

For participants, the online approach will bring:

- free-to-use modules designed to fit their exact learning and training needs
- anytime online, tablet or mobile access. This means learning can fit around day-to-day workloads and other responsibilities
- open access, with no application or membership of a college needed
- no stipulated end date, so users can complete the modules at their own pace.

The modules will be launched in phases by each college over the next 12 months. They will be available through the <u>NIHR Learn</u> platform.

Lab Tests Online-UK Annual report 2022

Lab Tests Online-UK is a free-to-access resource, developed by NHS laboratory professionals. It provides detailed descriptions of tests, conditions and illnesses, and news on the latest advances in laboratory medicine.

The website is non-commercial and free to access, with support provided by the Association of Clinical Biochemistry, the Institute of Biomedical Science and RCPath.
