# Continuing professional development

The College is dedicated to providing resources that help you stay current in your field. This includes the Pathology Portal and a range of events and webinars.

We also deliver an exemplary <u>CPD service</u> to support our members, including hosting a bespoke CPD portfolio to track your CPD activities. This helps you to identify areas for development and simplify the appraisal and revalidation process.

### Training and examinations

It is one of our key aims to ensure that our curricula, assessments and examinations promote the highest standards of pathology, in order to meet the future requirements of the profession.

Successful completion of our curricula requirements is the basis on which our members demonstrate their readiness to enter consultant practice. Our medical postgraduate curricula are accompanied by a training ePortfolio, the LEPT system, to help trainees evidence their progress

in training. Doctors who apply for specialist registration via the Portfolio Pathway are assessed by College members against the same curriculum standards, and may also access the LEPT system to gather evidence.

With dedicated support from our members, we develop and deliver the FRCPath, Diploma and Certificate examinations across 17 pathology specialties. We are committed to making our examinations accessible and aim to remove

barriers by providing reasonable adjustments for eligible candidates. We strive for excellence in this area by continuously developing the examinations and examiner recruitment process. This service could not be delivered without the support of our fantastic volunteer examiners.



## Professional guidance and support

Using a rigorous consultation process, we develop and publish a range of <u>professional</u> <u>guidance</u> that sets the standard of care across the profession.

This includes clinical guidelines and best practice recommendations, covering areas such as cancer datasets and tissue pathways, autopsy guidelines and laboratory service standards.

We cater to both cross-specialty and specialtyspecific needs, ensuring that all 17 pathology specialties receive comprehensive guidance.

We are an active participant in NICE consultations related to pathology, helping to shape national guidelines for treatments and care in the NHS in England and Wales.

We strive to ensure patient safety, facilitating several <u>National Quality Assurance Advisory Panels (NQAAPs)</u> across a range of pathology specialties.

#### **DID YOU KNOW?**

We have published over 140 guidelines across all specialties and categories.

Our patient safety and quality strategy further demonstrates our commitment to high standards of care and patient welfare. This strategy allows us to address unique safety concerns and challenges affecting pathology and proactively identify potential risks.

We further maintain standards in pathology by reviewing and approving consultant and SAS-level job descriptions, both medical and scientific. We provide an assessor to attend advisory appointment committees (AACs), to ensure employing bodies are able to appoint the right candidate for the post.

### Exclusive publications

You can stay up to date on the latest developments in pathology through our quarterly professional membership magazine, the Bulletin. We engage our diverse readership by provoking relevant discussions across regions and specialties.

Members also receive our monthly President's Newsletter, and have access to a range of discounted publications and journals.

## Awards, grants and prizes

We recognise the outstanding work of our members and support the pathology workforce through various <u>awards and bursaries</u>. This includes our annual <u>RCPath Achievement Awards</u>.

Foundation doctors can apply for our annual <u>Foundation Fellowships</u> to support their rotation through a pathology specialty.

We run competitions to encourage undergraduates and foundation doctors to explore pathology, such as the <u>Foundation Essay Prize</u> and <u>RCPath Science Communication Prize</u>.

We also run a <u>Medical Electives small grant</u> <u>scheme</u> to support undergraduate students who wish to undertake electives in pathology disciplines.

Our <u>Art of Pathology competition</u> is open to all, encouraging everyone to actively engage in pathology.

Furthermore, we collate information for our members on external funding opportunities relevant to pathologists.



### **Events**

We deliver an extensive programme of events and webinars to support you at every stage of your career. In collaboration with our Specialty Advisory Committees (SACs), we curate specialty-focused webinars for our members and Postgraduate Doctors in Training (PGDiTs). These provide expert insights from world-renowned speakers on fascinating and relevant topics.

To inspire the next generation of pathologists, we deliver specialty-specific careers talks to undergraduates and junior doctors. We also host the annual <u>Pathology Summer School</u> where medical students can learn more about pathology as a career.

From our New Fellows Ceremony to the New Consultants' Day, we run events to support our members as they progress in their career. We are the lead royal college for medical examiners and medical examiner officers, hosting training and an annual conference.

We partner with specialty experts and industry representatives to run events that encourage collaboration between industry and the profession.

Our <u>corporate membership scheme</u> provides industry leaders with a unique opportunity to connect and collaborate with pathologists.



In the UK, we work with the Pathology Alliance to support the delivery of <u>National Pathology Week</u>, an annual celebration of pathology. The College supports members to run public engagement activities that highlight pathology's essential role in healthcare. We also deliver events aimed at undergraduates and foundation doctors.

In addition to College-led events, members receive discounted access to <u>various external</u> <u>events and webinars</u> and can hire the College's venue spaces at reduced rates.

Research and innovation

Part of our mission is to promote study, <u>research</u> <u>and innovation</u> within the field of pathology. The College's <u>Research Committee</u> provides advice and guidance to the College, trainers and trainees, and academic pathologists about academic research. A key activity is to review and approve applications for <u>Fellowship by Published Works</u>.

As part of their role in raising the profile of research, the Research Committee administers the Research Fellowship Start-up Grants and the Trainee Research Medals for undergraduate and postgraduate students. We also promote other research funding opportunities for trainees and fellows.

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Pathologists are at the forefront of modern healthcare research. It is vital that the College supports our members as they devise new treatments and bring about medical advancements that greatly benefit patients."

# **Digital** pathology

The College supports the use of <u>digital pathology</u> in diagnosis, research, education and training. Since the appointment of a Digital Pathology Lead and formation of the Digital Pathology Committee in 2017, we have produced guidance, best practice recommendations and a <u>Digital Pathology Strategy</u>. Our work has included advocating for investment for digital pathology and pathology labs at NHS and government level, coordinating with Public Health England on the use of digital pathology in screening, and running annual training events in digital pathology.

We have written <u>a position statement</u> considering Al and its potential to transform healthcare, while maintaining the importance of professional leadership in Al development.

Furthermore, we have advised members individually on subjects such as remote working and how to use digital pathology to better support them in their role.



We have worked closely with key partners to deliver the award-winning <u>Pathology Portal</u> – a unique, innovative and adaptive learning platform. The Portal digitally hosts whole-slide images and a wide range of other resources, including teaching sessions and guizzes.

### Advocating for pathology

As a membership organisation, our central priority is advocating for the needs of our members and the wider profession. By uniting pathologists and those linked to pathology, we act as a collective voice that has the power to inform, influence and instigate change.

In the UK, we are dedicated to establishing strong policy positions <u>and acting on key priorities</u> for pathology across all 4 nations. To achieve this, we develop and maintain strong relationships with UK parliamentarians, government bodies, public audiences and industry partners. We advocate for policies and funding that bring true and lasting benefits to the pathology workforce and wider profession.

We <u>respond to key changes in pathology</u>, including workforce, cancer diagnostics and the impact of technological advancements.

We collate key insights and workforce data via our member census and surveys, to ensure our workforce planning is backed by robust evidence. Working with stakeholders and decision-makers, we can use this data to advocate for a well-resourced and sustainable pathology workforce.

We have also published a <u>workforce strategy</u> aimed at helping to address the workforce crisis impacting our members across pathology services. With your support and participation, we have the power to shape the present and future of the profession.



### A global community

We are proud to be a global professional body, with almost a quarter of our members based outside the UK.

Our Pathology is Global international strategy for 2023–2026 sets out our vision for promoting and advancing excellence in pathology internationally. This strategy serves as the College's long-term commitment to raising international standards in pathology, engaging overseas members more effectively, and sharing the College's knowledge, expertise, services and ideas as widely as possible.

Collaborating with international partners around the world is crucial in helping us to deliver our strategic vision. These collaborations take the form of Memoranda of Understanding (MoU), as well as volunteer support through our international regional advisors and country advisors.

Through these partnerships, we deliver <u>international projects</u> and produce <u>virtual resources</u> to support the professional development of pathologists and scientists worldwide.

In collaboration with international and UK partners, we develop virtual resources that support the professional development of pathologists and scientists globally.



We also support appropriately qualified international medical graduates (IMGs) through our <u>sponsorship schemes</u>. Open to trainees around the world, our schemes provide assistance to those who wish to obtain training experience in the UK.

We celebrate and showcase the global importance of pathology through the delivery of our annual <u>International Pathology Day</u> (IPD) event. Each year the IPD conference is centred around a relevant theme. Previous topics include digital pathology and AI, the impact of climate change on disease, and antimicrobial resistance.
